I am incredibly thankful that I attended the 2017 Direct Primary Care conference. As a medical student, it becomes discouraging to hear primary care often placed at the bottom of my classmates' desires and goals.

Direct primary care attracted my attention due to my stubbornness to cling to my ideals and interests as a potential primary care doctor. I think the best way to summarize the overriding theme of the weekend is total health--for both patients and providers. Various physicians spoke of how they had put their own twist on the direct primary care model to suit their passions. Free from 15-minute scheduled slots, many would often spend over an hour with a patient going over their concerns. Other physicians would visit a patient on their way home from church just to check up on them. One doctor would have her patients join in her exercise endeavors, and yet another would give talks at local high schools.

In my opinion, this is exactly what a primary care physician should be: an active member of the community.

In addition, this direct primary care conference opened my eyes to the financial burdens that impact the physician-patient relationship. After giving a presentation on the financial savings of direct primary care, one doctor put it best by extending the Hippocratic oath to also "do no financial harm" for patients. I was immensely impressed with how much

patients, businesses, and organizations could save financially while receiving such high quality care.

As a 3rd year student currently on rotations, I am beginning to see the challenges in providing high quality care faced by primary care physicians. Many are burnt out and have lost their passion, attempting to keep pace with the many demands required of them. And yet, here I got the chance to meet some of the funniest, humble, and down-to-earth individuals. With direct primary care, they could retain the creative and unique parts of what they loved while still being a physician. With so much packed into the medical curriculum, there is little time to learn real-world topics and issues such as economics, finance, politics, etc. This conference helped broaden my perspective to really consider what delivering optimal care would look like. It was inspiring to meet and learn from many physicians pursuing this avenue.


