Dr. Raul Artal, a Holocaust survivor, was born in a Nazi concentration camp. He is the Chairman and Professor Emeritus of the Department of Obstetrics, Gynecology and Women's Health at Saint Louis University. He is a graduate of Sackler School of Medicine, Tel Aviv University (where BRI has chapter!), is the author of over 200 publications and three books, and is internationally recognized for his expertise in high

risk obstetrics, exercise physiology, and ethical standards in medical practice/research.


**PANEL: Are the Tenets of Social Justice
